



Introduction to ADHD - Level 1

Introduction

This course will enable practitioners working with children and young people and/or their families to increase their understanding of Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD). The course will provide an overview of what ADHD is and the impact it has upon school and home life. By the end of the day practitioners will have the essential skills and knowledge to better support children and their families locally.

ADHD is thought to affect 2-5% of school-age children and young people in the UK (NICE, 2018).

It is essential that these individuals have a positive experience of care and support. For this to be achieved staff need a good understanding of ADHD and how to work effectively with the difficulties in their role.

No prior knowledge of ADHD is required; this is an introductory level course and is open to all practitioners working with children and young people.
